Entertainment Networking's Four-Letter Words — and What They Can Do for You

Entertainment networks need to handle more equipment and data than ever before. Discover how standard IEEE Ethernet protocols can be leveraged by the entertainment industry. This session will cover the so-called «The Four-Letter Words of Networking,» including DHCP, IGMP, RSTP, EAPS, VLAN, LLDP and a few other standards like QoS and Dante – and how to use them to your benefit when building a network with managed switches.

The presentation will conclude with an overview on networking security, describing some of the new cyber-security laws and how these will affect how you manage your networks in the years to come.

Figure Drawing Basics

This session will provide basic instruction on drawing the figure and a review of body proportions aimed at costume designers or anyone who would like a refresher.

Esther Van Eek designs costumes, masks, and props in Canada and the USA and is a proud member of CITT/ICTS, USITT, and the Associated Designers of Canada. She holds a BFA in Visual Art and an MFA in Production Design. An award-winning designer and educator, Esther teaches production and design at the University of Windsor.

Stage Drapery and the Fire Code

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This session is sponsored by

Stage Draperies require on-going care and maintenance to continue to look good and be safe. Presentation will discuss fabrics used in theatres, show tips on handling and caring for them to preserve their lifespan. Fire Safety on stages is a real issue- drapes are naturally flammable and, when exposed to hot lights, or electrical sparks, there is an increased risk of fire. Flameproofing on drapes form an important part of a theater's fire safety system. We review the different types of fabrics and flame retardant treatments available. In addition, we share practical knowledge from the field sharing little-known facts such as flame retardant wears off over time, and even Inherently Flame Retardant fabrics will become flammable with the accumulation of dust. Finally, we review how to make drapery compliant with the fire code without incurring the significant cost of replacement.

Brad Davies has been in the fire protection business since 2008. Having tested and re-treated thousands of textiles, Mr. Davies has years of field experience, has been an NFPA, USITT and CITT/ICTS member for years, has also published numerous articles on flame retardant testing and treatment, and has the privilege of being invited to discuss textiles and the fire code with many Safety Officials, Theater Professional Groups, and Fire Prevention Officers, most recently at the Fire and Emergency Services Training Institute (FESTI). Founded in 1978, On-Site Drapery Cleaners has grown to be the experts in same day curtain cleaning and flameproofing.

Partnership in Production Leadership

Means of Production is a collective of PMs and TDs working together to reexamine the way we build shows. Incubated by Generator, and funded by the Canada Council, from 2021-2022 we are researching and developing a values-based approach to production that prioritizes equitable, sustainable working conditions and improved relationships between Producers, PMs and TDs. This roundtable will discuss:

- What is a values-based approach to production?
- How can production and technical leadership contribute to the paradigm shift of building back better post-pandemic?
- Which tools and practices can PMs and TDs develop to support underrepresented arts workers and their productions?
- Where can PMs and TDs affect change to improve working conditions for
- arts workers, within or outside of an institutional framework?
- When must the show not go on?

Sue Balint, Producer, is a longstanding member of the Toronto arts community, having been active at various stages of her career as a playwright, dramaturg, theatre maker and currently as a producer and facilitator.

Pip Bradford, PM, Live Art, Production Outreach, is an arts worker based in Toronto, mostly working as a production manager and producer with dance companies and festivals.

Crystal Lee, PM, began her independent career as a freelance Production Manager in Toronto where she received a Harold Award for her contributions to the community. She currently works full-time with Why Not Theatre as their PM and TD.

Communicating: The Underbelly of the Production

The most important relationship a Stage Manager has in the production is with the director. Right? Maybe. Evolving from conversations within the SMArts Educators group (an online pandemic community of Stage Management Educators) this panel has been pulled together to explore the other relationships the SM has with their creative partners. This panel will feature a cast of characters, PMs, TDs, GMs, SMs, and Designers, talking to each other. Hopefully communicating. With the one goal of understanding the underbelly of our creative partnerships. The focus on the director / SM relationship is vital. But what about the PM / SM relationship? How do the TD and technical staff fit in? How do designers see their relationships with SMs? What can each of us learn from an open and frank conversation? What will you take away to add to your practice? Attendees get to ask the hard questions while the panel examines what lies beneath successful and harmful communications in the underbelly of production partnerships.

Aaron Kelly (Organizer, Co-moderator) is a theatre crafter. He is a Production Manager and Technical Director. He is a lighting, projection, image, and set creator for Dance, Theatre, and Opera.

How to build a better Team

We are on many «teams» throughout our work day. Often we find ourselves getting stuck making decisions within a group setting. Understanding the main barriers to performing within a team helps move the team forward.

Cheryl Batulis has worked in the Live Performance industry for 30 years. Bolstering her Labour Relations experience she headed back to Ryerson to expand her knowledge and people skills. Earning a BFA and then her Canadian Human Resources Professional (CHRP) designation she provides progressive and strategic HR business practices and coaching, central to the principle of supporting human capital, with programs dedicated to the whole person.

Working with an Advocate Architect on your Theatre Construction or Renovation Project

This session is sponsored by

Theatre construction and renovation projects are complex and expensive. By their nature, they attract big firms looking to build their portfolio along with big promises that don't necessarily align with available funding. To make things even more difficult, when there are so many interested parties at the table, it's not always clear to whom the project architects are responsible. Enter the Advocate Architect. "The role of the Advocate Architect is to provide support for the Owner and user-stakeholders within a complex project when there is no direct relationship between the Owner and the Consulting Architect." Canadian Handbook of Practice, Appendix D.

The Advocate Architect often reports directly to the organization's CEO/ Executive Director and Board Chair and works collaboratively with the organization's Steering Committee - which can be a combination of senior staff and board volunteers. This presentation will guide participants through the usual stages of a construction project from pre-design, conceptual design, detail design to construction with particular attention to project pitfalls and opportunities for the advocate architect to provide substantial value to your new construction or renovation project. Examples will be illustrated through the Royal Winnipeg Ballet New Student Dormitory and the Gas Station Arts Centre Feasibility projects.

Jason Robbins, Architect MAA, MRAIC, Int'l Assoc AIA, RIBA - JC ROBBINS

ARCHITECTURE is a licensed architect in Manitoba and President-Elect of the Royal Architectural Institute of Canada. He's the Board President of the Gas Station Arts Centre in Winnipeg and a former member of IATSE Local 63.

Globe Theatre Virtual Backstage Tour

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Globe Theatre, past, present, future. A look at the former Globe space and the future renovation plans. Devon Bonneau is a technical director at Globe, and an actor and theatre designer whose work has been seen on the Globe Theatre stage as well as the Globe's Sandbox Series. He was co-creator of this years 'Behind the Screams' Ghost Tour and is a graduate of the 2016 Globe Theatre Acting Conservatory.

Eryn Griffith, Lighting Designer and Production Manager, is currently the Director of Production at the Globe Theatre in Reina Saskatchewan. Eryn is a graduate of NTS, holds an MFA in Production Design from the University of Victoria and a BFA in Theatre Design from Concordia University.

Kate Jackson, Architect at P3A, completed her Master of Architecture at the University of Waterloo. Kate worked for P3A as a student in 2013, and she joined the firm full-time in 2016. As an Intern Architect she has been involved in the design and construction administration of a series of complex heritage projects.

Kenilee Kehler, is the Company Manager at Globe Theatre and has 12 years' experience as a SM. Kenilee holds a Bachelor of Fine Arts (Stage Management and Technical Theatre) and a Bachelor of Education both from the University of Regina.

Production and Promotion of Hybrid Events

Canada's Significant Theatre from the 1950's

This year marked the publication of Modern Theatres 1950 to 2020 edited by David Staples. Only one Canadian theatre is featured in the book with an essay by architect, Gary McCluskie of Diamond Schmitt Architects. Of it's day, the Festival Theatre in Stratford, Ontario was a remarkable design and unique to Canada. Gary will take us through why this 1957 built theatre was such an achievement and how to this day it still proves to be an outstanding example of how human ingenuity can make a great performing space. To bring us right up to date, we will also talk with Simon Marsden, the current Director of Production at the Stratford Festival Theatre.

Julian Sleath, General Manager at Yonge Dundas Square, is an experienced cultural programmer and planner with a long career as a theatre technical and production manager and then in developing programmes for music, public visual arts and lots more. Specialties: Event planning of large scale public events & programming. Getting building projects OPEN. Theatre and opera production, working with architects and engineers on new and renovated buildings for entertainment. Add to that Urban transformation projects.

Gary McCluskie, is a principal architect at Diamond Schmitt, championing the design and execution of the firm's civic, arts, and performance-focused architecture. His projects contribute to the global culture by combining creativity, consultation, and a commitment to design excellence. An expert force, and community-minded, he activates these cultural intuitions with authentic engagement, offering an immersive experience.

Simon Marsden works at the Stratford Festival as their Director of Production. In that capacity, he oversees the production department that comprises the behind the scenes support for the shows. He leads a management team to plan, manage and control a \$20 million budget representing a 1/3 of the Festival's annual expenditure. He has worked for the Festival in various capacities since 1995. Four years ago, he returned from Stratford upon Avon where he was working for the Royal Shakespeare Company in a similar capacity.

Reaching the Retirement Age in the Theatre Industry Roundtable

The first en mass wave of designers and technicians in Canadian history have reached or are reaching retirement age. What are the implications? Retirement into poverty or into well-being? Stopping work? Or, continuing to work? This session should be relevant to ages 20 to 60. We will all reach retirement age.

Rick Boychuk (Host), at various times in production, consulting, inventing and authoring. He has been responsible for his own well-being into retirement. Well, how has that worked out for him? What can you learn from his experience?

Susan Benson, is a set and costume designer in Canada, the United States, Europe, and Australia. She has designed for many Canadian companies and designed for the Stratford Festival of Canada for twenty-one seasons. Ms. Benson received her training at the West of England College of Art in Bristol and was honoured to be awarded the Order of Canada for her design work. She now lives and paints on Salt Spring Island BC.

Patricia Flood, University Professor, is a theatre, film and television designer and a past President of the Associated Designers of Canada. Pat has taught Design for the Theatre at Concordia University in Montreal and has recently retired as an Associate Professor in the School of English and Theatre Studies at the University of Guelph.

Miles Muir, City of Vancouver, TD, attended Malaspina College's tech theatre diploma program and was hired by the college full time as the Technical Director of the theatre. Miles has been the Technical Director of the three Civic Theatres (Queen Elizabeth Theatre, The Orpheum, and the Vancouver Playhouse), employed by the City of Vancouver for the last 22 years.

Morgan Myler, IATSE 58, stagehand, is an Education Coordinator and Vice President of I.A.T.S.E. Local 58. A graduate of Sherian College, Morgan has worked for about 30 years in live events as well as movies and television. He is an educator and continues to work incorporating his knowledge and skills into shows across North America.

Michael Whitfield, Freelance Designer, with over four decades of designing nationally and internationally for theatre, opera and ballet, he is one of Canada's most versatile and experienced lighting designers. During his years at Stratford he participated as a consultant on major upgrades to the lighting rigs at both the Festival and Avon theatres. Michael also designed for the Shaw Festival and for many of Canada's regional theatres, particularly the Grand Theatre, London and the Royal Manitoba Theatre Centre.

Immersive Tools for Musical Theatre Sound Design: An Introduction & Live Demonstration of Spacemap Go

Since graduating she has worked in various capacities within wardrobe departments across Ontario and the city of Toronto. In addition to her supervisory work, Alex also teaches and advises the students in the Theatre and Fashion programs.
