#### **Networking for Show Systems**

Thursday August 11 - 9:15 to 10:00 - Bianca Room

Networking for Show Systems is a course for individuals with a solid understanding of the design and implementation of networks for show systems. The course will focus on advanced concepts as they relate to industry standard protocols, topologies, and hardware.

After attending this presentation, attendees will:

- Familiarize with IEEE protocols used in entertainment networking.
- Choose the appropriate networking Topology.
- Understand redundancy options.
- Identify differences between entertainment class switches.

**Robert Bell** is Director, Product Market at Acuity Brands and oversees the development the entire Pathway Connectivity product line including the VIA entertainment class Ethernet switches. Previously he has worked as a product manager for Strand and as brand ambassador for Vari\*Lite. He's well known for his involvement with WYSIWYG and as an author.

#### Using rope access and climbing style hardware in theatrical rigging

Thursday August 11 - 9:15 to 10:00 - Cassio AB Room

Using rope access and climbing style hardware in theatrical rigging: With the advances in rock climbing and industrial rope access, there are a number of different tools and techniques that can be adapted from those industries to make certain rigging tasks easier or safer. So how can we start implementing that hardware safely, while still using it within its intended design.

After attending this presentation, attendees will be able to determine if specific nontheatrical rigging hardware will be useful in a theatrical environment. They should be able to select carabiners, rigging plates, descent control devices that will do the job safely and within the safe working loads.

Born in Calgary, **Graeme Janzen** has been doing theatrical lighting, rigging and performer flying for 10 years. Over the years, he has flown performers for Calgary Opera's production of Everest, 9 years of the Calgary Stampede Grandstand Show while working for Chicago based Vertigo and most recently Alberta Ballet's production of PHI. In 2018, he started Gaslamp FX INC which specializes in aerial rigging hardware, fall protection and rope access hardware after seeing a need within the Alberta community for quality rigging hardware suppliers.

#### The Right Sauce for the Source

Thursday August 11 - 10:45 to 12:15 - Bianca Room

What do costume changes, hats, wigs and makeup all have in common? How about, they're all things the audio team in any theatre love to hate! Luckily, there's more than one way to tackle these artistic hurdles and come out with a show that sounds amazing. Join DPA Microphone's Paul Andrews for this interactive, practical session on live microphone techniques for theatre. During the session, Paul will take a volunteer from the group and mic them up as if they were about to go on stage. He'll show best-in-practice mic'ing techniques for live theatre application, as well as suboptimal mic techniques that are often deployed out of necessity, and how the placement of the microphone in each of these scenarios affects the sound and speech intelligibility of the performer on stage.

Paul will record live samples using a variety of different microphone types and placement techniques, and then play back the audio for all to hear. This session will focus on the usage of DPA lavalier microphones to get the exact sound you desire from the stage - right from the source - with little (or no) processing involved. Although this session will be geared towards live microphone techniques in theatre, Paul's background in live music, studio recording and location sound shall not be forgotten. Participants are encouraged to challenge Paul with any mic'ing scenario they've faced... we're positive he'll be able to offer a solid recommendation and maybe even share some contextual experience of his own as well!

Paul Andrews began his musical career as a student at the University of Denver, studying classical guitar under Ricardo Iznaola. He then made the transition into audio recording at A&M Records, and before joining the team at DPA stationed in Nashville, Paul was the Owner/Engineer of Bridge Recording Studios in Colorado. During his extensive career in audio recording, Andrews has worked with artists such as Sheryl Crow, Aerosmith, Boyz II Men, Dennis Chambers, Bill Evans and the CSU Symphony Orchestra and Big Band.

#### Watchout Video

Thursday August 11 - 10:45 to 12:15 - Cassio AB Room

This will be a quick introduction to Watchout. From preliminary set up, computer and projector placement, networking and testing the system to be ready for the designer.

After attending this presentation participants will have a basic knowledge of what Watchout is and how to set it up.

**Daniel Plumtree** is a Watchout video technician who has been doing video for Alberta Ballet, Calgary Opera, University of Calgary Drama and Theatre Calgary. He has been with Watchout since Version 3 and have toured Canada and America with it.

#### Re-purpose, Up-cycle, Re-imagine. Can Costume Go Green?

Thursday August 11 - 14:00 to 15:30 - Bianca Room

A primary focus of the World Stage Design 2022 conference is ecoscenography. What can we as artists, creators, and makers do to consume less, pollute less, and yet maintain aesthetics that appeal to our audiences and serve the story we are telling?

In my presentation, I will offer some ways costume designers can contribute to the greening of the theatre by considering what something can be rather than only what it is. Re-purposing garments from stock, thrift stores and donations from one period to another is one way to give these garments a second (or third) life, saving money and keeping them out of the landfill in the meantime. I will solicit additional ideas from session participants and hope to assemble a resource guide to be made available to them on the Canadian Institute for Theatre Technology (CITT/ICTS) website.

After this presentation, participants will be able to:

- · Look at existing garments for what they can become;
- see potential in the outdated and ugly;
- re-create one historical silhouette form another;
- reference the resource guide;
- · contribute to the resource guide.

Esther Van Eek, a proud member of CITT/ICTS, USITT, and the Associated Designers of Canada, designs costumes, masks, and props in Canada and the USA. She holds a BFA in Visual Art and an MFA in Production Design. An award-winning designer and educator, Esther teaches production and design at the University of Windsor.



Ryan will show how Propared can be used at an organizational level to manage productions, projects, and venues to speed up workflow, improve communication, reduce logistics mistakes, and improve work-life balance.

Ryan will conduct a brief demonstration of Propared and show how to assemble a project timeline, coordinate spaces, schedule people, calculate show costs and labour budgets, and track inventory. He will then show how to communicate a range of instantly updated information via weblinks including calendars & schedules, contact lists, rehearsal & performance reports, inventory lists, client budgets, and other customizable documents. A fully unlocked training license will be given to all attendees to use for 30 days. This session is recommended for anyone involved in production management, scheduling, budgeting, resource management, and staffing who are interested in improving their workflow.

**Ryan Kirk** is co-founder and creator of Propared. He has held management positions in theater, TV, fashion, corporate events, and venue operations for 20 years. Ryan also cofounded Tinc Productions, a Broadway production management company based in New York City. He holds a BA in Theatre Arts from Virginia Tech and a MBA from NYU.

#### Expanding the Art of Sound in Live Theatre

Thursday August 11 - 16:00 to 17:30 - Bianca Room

When live performance crews first began deploying electronic amplification systems to cover larger audience spaces, the early technology compromised the sonic experience by having to reduce the number of locations where the audience perceived the sound as originating from. Radio, movies, and television suffered from this same limitation. One loudspeaker, one point source. Very unnatural. This of course is a contrast to what we humans experience in everyday life with sound coming to our ears from all directions, and our brains ability to provide perception cues about the location of each sound source around us.

As technology has improved and costs have come down, it is now possible to do complex manipulation and control of sound to not only better reproduce the sonic experience of the world outside, but also to extend the available sound palette in the theatre to allow for expanding the art of sound. One tool that is now available is Spacemap Go, the latest version of a programming multi-channel panner that is supported on the Meyer Sound GALAXY signal processor. This allows control from an iPad of dynamic moving effects.

Join Meyer Sound's Digital Products Solutions Architect, Richard Bugg, for this informative session on the evolution of surround sound in live theatre, where we are at with it today, and what Richard believes the future might hold for artistic sound engineers and the art of sound in theatre.

**Richard Bugg** is the Digital Products Solutions Architect for Meyer Sound. He is responsible for developing solutions to meet demanding artistic requirements for Meyer Sound customers. For the past two decades Richard has been working with Digital Audio Show Control and immersive sound design for live performance. His formal training was in music instrumental performance and composition. His previous experiences include touring sound mixer, technical writer, and Digital Products Tech Support Manager. His current work for Meyer Sound is focused on the user interface implementation for digital audio networking.

From ladder safety to air quality Don has experienced it first hand and can help you navigate the world of Performing arts safety.

#### Reimagining the Tom Patterson Theatre

Friday August 12 - 9:00 to 10:30 - Bianca Room

Designing a new theatre to replace a beloved but inadequate performance space took the Stratford Festival on a journey of discovery. An international design competition winnowed a long list of architects to one - one which had never designed a theatre before. The winning design by Hariri Pontarini Architects will be examined in close detail for how it met the client's objectives to provide a versatile, multi-use facility with a state-of-the-art auditorium. Stage dimensions and capacity would be similar to the former theatre but enhanced in every respect.

The technical considerations include advanced lighting and sound equipment to meet stringent acoustic and energy-use objectives for the LEED Gold design. This case study of the new Tom Patterson Theatre reveals the wide range of options and decisions made to create a performance space to take the Stratford Festival into the future.

**Doron Meinhard** is associate partner with Toronto-based Hariri Pontarini Architects. His extensive experience on cultural and institutional buildings includes managing the complex and multi-award-winning Bahai'i Temple of South America. Meinhard has led signature and large-scale projects including the Richard Ivey Building at Western University and The Welcome Project at the Royal Ontario Museum.

**Greg Doughtery** is the Technical Director of the Stratford Festival's Tom Patterson Theatre. He is thrilled to have been a part of constructing and opening this new venue. Previous roles include Technical Director of Canadian Stage, Theatre Aquarius, Opera Hamilton, as well as working with several Canadian music artists on shows around the globe.

**Joshua Dachs** is one of the world's leading theatre consultants and has led Fisher Dachs Associates' consulting practice for over 30 years. Drawing on his background as a violinist, an architect, and a theatrical set and lighting designer, he has provided planning, programming, and design for projects worldwide. He has created some of the most innovative, flexible, and transformable venues in the world.

#### Mentoring: Small Steps, Big Results

Most great leaders have had mentors and mentees. Their success depends on this relationship. It is well known that mentoring builds and maintains a skilled workforce. Are you deciding to find a mentor or become one? Are you familiar with all of the elements involved? What are the benefits no matter where you are in the production chain?

This presentation will explore the fundamentals of mentorships with the goal of bringing clarity and understanding of the mentor/mentee process. The session will break down the what, why, how, and who aspects, identify the best qualities of a good mentor and mentee, benefits and risks, target motivation tips and best practices. Planning for mentorship, and optimizing mentorship opportunities within the production context will be discussed with a goal of participants becoming fully prepared to enter into a Mentor/Mentee relationship.

**Deborah Osborne** is a Media Executive, Production Planner, Consultant, and Trainer with Terrier Marketing. Her 30+ year career began in theatre and opera stage management. In addition to working on film, television and live productions, Deborah has authored articles for industry publications and taken leadership roles in innovative training initiatives, academic courses, seminars and workshops. In 2016 Deborah was honoured with a Crystal Award for Mentorship by Women In Film & Television.

# Complete conversion of your incandescent stage lighting system to an LED system the easy way

Friday August 12 - 10:45 to 12:15 - Bianca Room

The session will demonstrate how to convert an incandescent stage lighting system to an LED system using the existing electrical infrastructure. Two recent projects will be used as models. The sessions will demonstrate:

- How the reduced operational costs of an LED system will fund the conversion expense and how long the pay back will take;
- how to use the existing incandescent system infrastructure;
- how to convert the house lighting system LED and the importance of dim to black;
- how the LED system deals with the emergency lighting system;
- the options for DMX control infrastructure;
- how quickly the change over can happen.

Before coming to RWDI **Richard Schick** was principal of the Theatre Consulting firm Schick Shiner and Associates. He served as General Manager of the Citadel Theatre in Edmonton, Producer/General Manager of the Gateway Theatre in Richmond, B.C. and the Production Manager of the Citadel Theatre for ten years.

#### 2022 TIP Prize Winners

Friday August 12 - 10:45 to 12:15 - Cassio AB Room

The objective of this presentation is for attendees to have a better understanding of the inventions that won the 2022 TIP prizes and be able to recreate these inventions for use in their own theatres.

#### 1st Prize: Soldering Wire Holder

Imagine you are on a 4-meter mobile elevating work platform and you have to rewire an LED strip, you are holding a solder gun and you only have one hand free to hold your wire and LED. It's not easy to use one hand for soldering those little points together. You need something to make the LED and wire stay put. Learn how to make your very own soldering wire holder.

#### 2nd Prize: Acoustic Circles

The hall where I work had poor acoustic qualities. Eventually I came up with a design that did the job: theater fabric stretched on a circular frame made out of PVC tubing for electric wiring. While the tension of the fabric would deform lightweight rectangular frames, it keeps the circular ones in shape.

#### 3rd Prize: 3D-Printed Cable-Hook for I-Beam

This Cable Hook was designed to help store and keep cables organized in a trap room of a theater. It was printed with a Envovo X1 3d printer, using Repetier and Slic3r. The piece was originally designed in AutoDesk Inventor and exported as an STL file. The file is then uploaded to Repetier, which is a program that interfaces with this 3d printer.

Cathy Ka Po Ho - Born in Vancouver, Canada, currently living in Taipei, Taiwan. Ho is a technical designer working in the field of theater, installation art and public art. She holds a Bachelor Degrees of Fine Arts degree from National Taiwan Normal University (NTNU).

**Joris Thiry** was born in 1965. After his lutier studies he kind of tumbled from one job in to another: stage hand, producing design lighting, sign painter, guitar roadie and as up to now, stage technician.

**Joe (Hsun) Chiang** is currently enrolled at Yale University in the David Geffen School of Drama, Technical Design and Production Program. He was born and raised in Taiwan. Prior to coming to Yale, he was a freelance theatre Technical Director in Taiwan.

#### The Joy of Historical Research

Friday August 12 - 15:45 to 16:45 - Bianca Room

In 'Nobody Looks Up: The History of Counterweight Rigging System:...» I postulated upon the tenuous links between the early development of stage rigging and a nautical heritage. New found evidence - in June of this year - sheds some light upon the early days. But as many questions as are answered by this evidence, a whole new set of questions arise. The joy of this research is truly falling down the metaphoric rabbit hole. This session will appeal not only to the Canadian members of the CITT/ICTS, but also to our international guests. After attending this presentation participants will go away with a new appreciation of the genesis of our scenic technology.

**Rick Boychuk** is the author of «Nobody Looks Up: The History of the Counterweight Rigging System: 1500 to 1925». He is currently researching the follow up edition, which is scheduled for release in 2027.

Bill is the chair of the ETCP Arena Subject Matter Experts and a member of the ETCP Council. He serves on ESTA's Technical Standards Committee and is co-Chair of the ANSI accredited Rigging Working Group. Bill sits on the Board of Directors for the Behind the Scenes Charity.

Bill is a USITT Fellow and a member of ABTT. He is a founding member of the Long Reach Long Riders, an industry based charity motorcycle group. He is the Executive Producer of BackStage Pass, a video interview series on YouTube and an organizer of the ESTA/USITT New World Rigging Symposium. Bill is also the Executive Director Emeritus of the North American Theatre Engineering and Architecture Conference (NATEAC).

#### Sailors and Stagehands - The end of the saga

Thursday August 11 - 17:00 to 18:00 - Bianca Room

Peter McKinnon will talk about his book, Sailors and Stagehands, and tell folks about the many twists and turns his research has taken, and what the end result is. At the end of this presentation, participants will have a much better understanding of our backstage heritage. Peter will sign any that want signing.

About the book: The impetus for the Sailors and Stagehands came from a friend at a CITT/ICTS Conference whose opinion was that the idea that the first stagehands were sailors was a myth. I figured that if he was correct, then a book disproving this commonly held belief would certainly be a hot item. And if it turned out that the first stagehands actually were former sailors, then it would be a fun bit of research. Thus began a multi-year journey into known and unknown territory for me; a trek that has been both rich and fascinating. As much as anything else, the book is the narrative of my research voyage.

Peter McKinnon has had a long life in the theatre that has included many roles. He was a lighting designer and technical director for dance and opera for a decade, that included more touring than he cares to remember. He founded two theatre companies as general manager, and later became a producer in Edinburgh and New York both off-and on-Broadway. He taught theatre production at Toronto's York University for 36 years, and was on the Executive Committee of OISTAT for 16 of those years. He was in charge of «local arrangements» for the first World Stage Design in Toronto in 2005, and survived. He was one of the editors for new Theatre Words, and co-edited the two volume World Scenography with Eric Fielding. He is launching what he hopes will be his last book, Sailors and Stagehands, at WSD in Calgary.

#### **Collaborative Strategies**

How the theatre industry in Canada will ride out the labour shortage, inflation and the unpredictable supply chain in our efforts to successfully rebuild and reopen

Saturday August 13 - 14:30 to 16:00 - MacEwan Ballroom

This panel discussion is sponsored by







This panel aims to discuss how difficult it is to rebuild/reopen given the labour shortage and the cost and availability of materials.

- How will designs need to change to reflect the rising cost of material and the potential material availability issues?
- Should design deadlines move earlier in the process to allow for longer delivery and execution time?
- How are TDs, PMs, carpenters, and other practitioners approaching the costing of set and costume materials and labour, prop elements and technical gear when the costs can potentially change drastically from prelim to final?
- What are the hidden, or not so hidden, impacts for all design elements, including costumes and props, lighting, sound, and video?
- Will the workflow and ability to fully realize designs change with these complications?
- How will the current labour shortage impact these issues? What will the current lack of PMs and TDs mean for the coming season?
- What is the broader, long-term impact of these issues?
- Do we scale down for the interim to ride out inflation and the supply chain and staff shortage complications?
- In all the above questions, what have learned from the last 2 years that can be actively initiated and acted up to improve and sustain our industry?
- Are we succeeding in implementing these lessons or have we simply returned to the way it was but with massive labour shortages and an increased stress on those who remain?
- How do we bring these issues to producing companies and respectfully expect these issues to be considered when choosing seasons and discussing production complexity?

After this discussion, participants will be able to find common ground on how to produce work this coming year. The industry needs strategies and ways of working that will help us ride out the labour shortage, materials shortage, and rising costs of doing business. This discussion is ideally a continuation of the efforts made to collaborate and share information across the country. We will seek actionable ideas and sustainable strategies. We seek to continue the cross-country collaboration fostered during the pandemic.

Participants will include Technical Directors, Production Managers, Designers, Head Carpenters and other professionals who are strategizing for the upcoming season.

**Moderator:** Andrea Lundy has been a Production Manager and Lighting Designer for the past 34 years across Canada and internationally. She is currently the Director of the Production Design and Technical Arts Program at the National Theatre School of Canada.

He toured and produced across North America and Europe, and has also been a General Manager, Lighting and Sound Operator, Carpenter, and Technical Director. 
